320 million and counting that's the number of children impacted by COVID-19 in India according to UNESCO. Although online classes have started but there are millions of children who don't have accesses to computers smartphone or even internet and electricity at home. To battle this fight, SOS India started tuition support programmes for the underprivileged children to bridge the gap of online classes. The tuition centers are functioning in closed school verandas and other open spaces in the community, in small groups following all COVID prevention protocols supported by volunteers and tutors appointed by SOS. The tuition centers also work as an umbrella against child labor, child marriages and a forum to educate children Covid prevention and child rights. Foreseeing the recession and economic crisis emerging form Covid situation SOS also supporting families of these children with additional livelihood options to ensure the child care is not interrupted by the economic crisis.
