Earlier, during the peak of the pandemic, she worked in a hospital in Abu Dhabi. She spoke about her journey to the children, inspiring them to work hard and study well.

Giving wings to dreams

Somnath Nimhan's parents are differently abled. In order to earn a living, his father purchased a weighing machine, with which he sits at a central location that sees many passersby. The minimal amount he charges helps him secure customers. Struggling through the years, Somnath managed to pass his class XII from a Government school. Even though he wanted to pursue further studies, he was unable to because of his family's financial condition. So instead, he decided to work part-time in a general store and support his family. The youngster was not happy with his job, but limited by his qualifications, he also couldn't find a better opportunity.

On discussing his challenges with a friend, he got to know about the skilling opportunities offered by SOS Children's Villages of India, and opted for a one-year Diploma in Radiology from VIVO Healthcare Institute, Pune. He is attending all his classes on a regular basis, while working part time, and hopes to begin his career in Radiology soon. He says that this career will serve as a springboard for a better life for him and his family.





A second chance at family

Khushbu Raut has just given her class X exams. She stays with her maternal aunt, grandparents, and other family members. Since April 2021, Khushboo and her sister Sheelu, 11 years of age, have been a part of the Kinship Care programme. Khushboo loves Maths, Physics and Chemistry, and wants to be a loco pilot after her class XII. The Kinship Care programme extends her caregiver (maternal aunt) financial support pertaining to food, clothing, and maintenance, besides emotional and psychological support and counselling for Khushbu and Sheelu, as and when needed. During the pandemic, the children's education was also supported by providing them a tablet.

Sheelu says: "I love dance, and wanted to always learn Bharatnatyam, which I am now learning thanks to the support I have been receiving under the Kinship Care programme. Maths is my favourite subject too, and didi helps me if I have doubts." Khushbu chips in: "I am curious by nature, and hence am very inquisitive. Since I have been a part of the programme, I have gained confidence, because I now know that I can follow my dream, without worrying about basic necessities in life."

Over 1,820 youth were skilled in a year and 1,164 were successfully placed with an average salary of Rs 15,938 per month in 2021. Above 970 youth were skilled

in Hyderabad.
